3	3:04	Step Number 1: Decide what the purpose will be	<p>Teachers might use this opportunity to look at a time of day in the class schedule that is difficult for students (perhaps a time of rest or a time of transition). Discuss this with the students and ask if they think making a list of music to listen to might help. 5	4:21	Step Number 3: Decide what music is going to be on your playlist	<p>Regardless of whether you chose to make this a group or an individual activity, teachers must give students some parameters for appropriate songs. Suggestions are: no profanity or violence in the lyrics, tempo that matches the goal, lyrics that match the goal, familiar or unfamiliar music to match the goal.</p> <p>Group activity: Ask for suggestions from the class for songs that match the playlist goal. Write them down as a visual aid. Then have the students collaboratively help trim down the song selections until the most appropriate or the most favourable songs remain.</p> <p>Individual activity: Have each student list as many songs as they can that match the individual playlist goal. You might choose to assign this for homework if the students struggle to remember the names of songs. Then give the students time to trim the list down to match an appropriate playlist length.</p> <p>Order matters here.
